7. Continue making add more details.


African Mask Art - In Africa, masks represent animals and ancestors, and wearing one, they believe, turns a tribal warrior or leader into an invincible force to reckon with.

Aboriginal Dream Art - Most Aboriginal Artists paint facets of their Dreaming which forms a share of their inheritance and identity.

Relief - Relief is a sculptural technique where the sculpted elements remain attached to a solid background of the same material

How to create an African Mask using cardboard.

1. Design your African Mask. It must be symmetrical. It must include pattern. Symbolism: images that represent things to do with something you want to improve about yourself.
2. Refine your idea. Draw the mask so it fills an A4 page add colour.
3. Create a template for the shape of the mask. Tip: Fold the piece of paper in half and draw half of the shape on one side.
4. Cut out the shape and lay it a piece of corrugated cardboard. Cut out the shape from the cardboard.
5. Using the main template draw the shapes from your design onto it. Cut out each individual shape and use as a template on the cardboard. Cut out a minimum of 3 pieces of cardboard for each shape so you can stick them onto each other to create a thick relief.
6. Repeat the process until the design is created.
7. Mix PVA and water together a thick cream consistency.
8. Lay strips of newsprint onto the cardboard mask. Paint the PVA water mix onto the strips. Cover the mask with 3 layers of newsprint paper.
9. Paint the design onto your design. Include pattern. Do not leave any gaps. Paint in one direction.



How to create an Aboriginal dream painting.

1. Design the symbols in your story. Create simple images that are connected to elements of your story.
2. Mix together poster paint (tall bottles) and PVA glue.
3. Use the end of pencil to create the dots. Draw your symbols on the paper first in pencil go over the top in dots. Make sure the dots are very close together (almost touching)
4. Repeat the dots going around the symbols. The more dots the more effective the technique.
