| A. KEYSTONE VOCABULARY   |                     |  |
|--------------------------|---------------------|--|
| 1                        | patriotism          | Enthusiastic support for your country.   |
| 2                        | heroism             | Bravery recognised or celebrated by others.  |
| 3                        | duty                | A responsibility; something you <b>should</b> do.  |
| 4                        | brutality           | Cruel or savage violence   |
| 5                        | disillusionment     | Disappointment that something/someone was not as good as you thought; the breaking of a spell. |
| 6                        | trauma              | A damaging and life-changing experience.   |
| B. KEY TECHNIQUE or TERM |                     |  |
| 7                        | tone                | Mood or emotion.   |
| 8                        | stanza              | A 'paragraph' or verse in a poem.  |
| 9                        | rhyme               | Words that end with the same sound, often to end lines.  |
| 10                       | rhythm              | A strong, regular repeated pattern of sound.   |
| 11                       | rhetorical question | A question which has an obvious 'right' answer.  |
| 12                       | repetition          | When the same word appears twice or more.  |
| 13                       | symbolism           | Where an object/image stands for a bigger idea.  |
| 14                       | metaphor            | A comparison of two things which says one thing <b>is</b> another.                             |
| 15                       | simile              | A comparison of two things, which says one thing is <b>like</b> or <b>as</b> another.          |
| 16                       | extended metaphor   | A metaphor that carries on throughout a text or paragraph.                                     |
| 17                       | personification     | Giving human features to something non-human.  |

| 18                       | colloquial          | Familiar or informal.  |
| 19                       | jingoism            | Extreme love for your country.   |
| 20                       | industrialised      | To build up using technology or machinery.   |
| 21                       | to tackle           | To try to overcome or beat.  |
| 22                       | to pursue           | To chase or hunt.  |
| 23                       | procession          | A line of people, usually marching or walking for a reason.                                    |
| 24                       | porcelain           | Very delicate white china.   |
| 25                       | eternal             | Everlasting.   |
| 26                       | flare               | Flame given off by guns/ bombs.  |
| 27                       | obscene             | Offensive or horrifying to look at.  |
| 28                       | dignity             | A human being's basic honour and respect.  |
| 29                       | to preach           | To teach about right and wrong, sometimes in a supercilious way.                               |
| 30                       | to dispel           | To break out of a spell.   |
| 31                       | a spool             | A wheel.   |
| 32                       | impassive           | Uncaring, without emotion.   |
| 33                       | to writhe           | To twist and wriggle, usually in pain.   |
| 34                       | to conceal          | To hide.   |
| 35                       | supercilious        | Acting as if you are superior to/ above someone else.  |
| 36                       | conscience          | A person's inner sense of right and wrong.   |
